Faye Mishna is Dean and Professor at the Factor-Inwentash Faculty of Social Work, University of Toronto and is cross-appointed to the Department of Psychiatry. Faye holds the Margaret and Wallace McCain Family Chair in Child and Family. Faye worked in children's mental health for over 20 years and prior to joining the Faculty, she was Clinical Director of a children's mental health centre serving children and youth with learning disabilities. Faye is a graduate and faculty at the Toronto Child Psychoanalytic Program and maintains a small private practice in psychotherapy and consultation.

Faye's program of research includes research on bullying, cyber bullying, cyber counseling and cyber technology in counseling and interventions with vulnerable children and youth. An integral component of her research entails collaboration with community organizations. Her scholarly publications have focused on bullying, clinical practice and social work education practice and more recently on cyber technology in counselling. Faye is the author of a book on bullying published by Oxford University Press.

Faye is currently conducting a longitudinal study on cyber bullying among students in grades 4, 7 and 10, funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC), entitled *Motivations for Cyber Bullying: A Longitudinal and Multi-Perspective Inquiry*. She is also conducting research on the implications of cyber technology for social work practice, funded by Bell.

## **Annotated Bibliography of Current/Ongoing Research Projects**

### **Motivations for Cyber Bullying: A Longitudinal and Multi-Perspective Inquiry** 2011-2014

This study, for which I am the Principal Investigator, is funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC). Objectives are to: 1) explore children's and youth's experiences and conceptions of cyber bullying; 2) explore the definitions and views of cyber bullying of parents and teachers; 3) explore how children and youth view the underlying motivations for cyber bullying; 4) document the development, shifting roles, and rates of cyber bullying victimization and perpetration; and 5) identify risk and protective factors for involvement in cyber bullying in children and youth aged 9 to 18 (grades 4, 7, 10 over three years). This research will contribute to theoretical understanding of cyber bullying and its motivations and will inform intervention strategies to address cyber bullying. We have begun year 1 of the study with approximately 20 schools in the Toronto District School board.

**The Bell Canada Cyber Counseling Research, Training and Service Project** 2008 -  
Cyber activity has momentous implications for traditional counseling. The aim of this project is to develop and research this new, rapidly growing and innovative form of counseling and to disseminate the findings in order to contribute to the knowledge and skill base. I am the lead for all aspects of the project. Components include:

- This was the fourth and last year of a four-year pilot cyber counseling research and training initiative lab funded by Bell, which involved partnering with two University of Toronto undergraduate colleges. MSW social work practicum students offered face-to-face and cyber counseling to undergraduate students in these colleges. This project was unique in educating MSW students through a practicum placement, conducting research including developing a measure to evaluate competence, and providing service (combining pedagogy with social

services). Both colleges were enthusiastic and found the service valuable. We have created a partnership among the University of Toronto, Faculty of Arts and Science (all colleges), the Factor-Inwentash Faculty of Social Work and Health and Wellness Office of Student Life. Beginning in September 2012, we will continue this service for a three year period.

This project is expected to contribute to the literature and to practice by identifying and understanding competencies and other issues and challenges related to cyber counseling. The practicum component will situate graduates of this program to be among the few counselors considered qualified to provide cyber counseling.
