RESEARCHER SPOTLIGHT



Dr. Jule Eilts

Dr. Jule Eilts is currently a scientific associate at Ludwig Maximilian University of Munich. She received her Ph.D. from Carl von Ossietzky University of Oldenburg where she continued to conduct applied research on bullying and peer victimization before moving to Ludwig. Her research has extensively focused on bullying, peer victimization, and related psychosocial factors in youth. Notably, she co-developed and validated a short version of the Bullying Participant Behaviors Questionnaire (BPBQ) for German adolescents (Eilts et al., 2025, Journal of Psychoeducational Assessment), contributing a psychometrically sound tool for bullying assessment. Her empirical work has explored the co-occurrence of bullying roles and their associations with social-emotional difficulties and examined the link between bullying involvement and internalizing problems. She has investigated risk and protective factors for bullying and victimization in students with emotional and behavioral disabilities through systematic review and meta-analysis. Her research also addresses the roles of attachment, emotion regulation, empathy, callous-unemotional traits, and moral disengagement in bullying perpetration and victimization. She has contributed to studies examining school satisfaction, moral identity, and behavioral problems in the context of bullying. Dr. Eilts has collaborated on projects spanning measurement development, prevalence studies, and intervention evaluation. Through these publications, she has helped advance the understanding of bullying dynamics, measurement, and prevention, with a particular focus on diverse and vulnerable student populations.

The article, led by Linnea Zimmerman examines how opportunity structures (parental influence and neighborhood context) affects individual agency among boys and girls in Kinshasa, DRC. We used longitudinal data to identify three distinct groups for boys and girls in each domain. Parental monitoring was associated with the development of both domains for boys, but showed no association for girls. Conversely, parental closeness was more strongly associated with development for girls, than for boys. Neighborhood safety was associated with greater Voice and Freedom of Movement for both boys and girls. Neighborhood trust was associated with Freedom of Movement but not Voice for boys, but the opposite for girls. Interventions should consider gendered ways in which parental and neighborhood factors influence agency.

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Dr. Astha Ramaiya, BRNET member, collaborated on a special issue exploring the influences of various factors on adolescent mental health in Kenya, Indonesia and Vietnam using the data from the National Mental Health Surveys. This supplement presents findings from the 2025 National Adolescent Mental Health Surveys (NAMHS) conducted in Kenya, Indonesia, and Vietnam among adolescents aged 10–17, using the DISC-5 diagnostic tool to assess the prevalence of six common mental disorders, self-harm, suicidal behavior, and related risk and protective factors. Individual papers explore mental health among sexual and gender diverse adolescents and examine adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), bullying (both victimization and perpetration), social support, and mental health service utilization. This project was a joint collaboration between University of Queensland School of Public Health, Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, African Population and Health Research Center, Universitas Gadjah Mada and the Institute of Sociology - Vietnam Academy of Social Sciences.
